Overview

In Year 4, the students will spend a minimum of three days a week in hospital and one day a week in Primary Care Clinical Teaching (PCCT).

There are two clinical rotations: 16 weeks Acute Adult Care (including Palliative Care) and 15 weeks Specialities

Acute Adult Care

- One 16-week rotation where you will do placements in Medicine and Surgery, including spending some time in the Emergency Department, a 'peri-operative care' week and two weeks in Palliative Care.

Specialities

- Paediatrics (5 weeks)
- Obstetrics & Gynaecology (5 weeks)
- Psychiatry (5 weeks)

Primary Care Clinical Teaching (PCCT) Days

- For one day each week throughout the year students will attend 30 days of Primary Care Clinical Teaching, PCCT, facilitated by GP Clinical Teaching Fellows (GPCTF)



Aims

The aims of Year 4 of the Medical Programme at Lancaster build on those already established:

- To expand and deepen the student's understanding of the medical sciences underlying clinical practice.
- To apply the clinical and communication skills previously learnt in clinical practice both in hospital and in the community.
- To increase the awareness of the scope of professional practice. In addition to treating disease and promoting health, the doctor needs to be aware of the wider determinants of health of the general public.

The curriculum is designed to allow these aims to be met progressively.



Patient Journeys

Surgical:

Pre-op to theatre to recovery to post-op review next day and longer .

Reflect on admission issues co-morbidities and impact on planning/prep pre-theatre,
pre-op analgesia etc

WHO check list

Scrubbing-up and intra-op care

Post-op analgesia and symptoms management (eg nausea, bowels, wound care, fluids
and O2)

Consideration of VTE prophylaxis and post op management of co-morbidities,
Discharge planning.

Incident Reporting
