COVID VIDEO UPDATE

TRUST APPOINTS NEW LEAD CANCER NURSE

Experienced nurse Jessica Jones has been appointed as Lead Cancer Nurse at Blackpool Victoria Hospital.

Jessica has worked at the hospital for 15 years, most recently as Macmillan Clinical Transformation Lead, where she led and supported the clinical teams to deliver personalised care for patients

including the implementation of Personalised Stratified Follow-up Pathways.

As Lead Cancer Nurse, she will work with clinical teams to improve the outcomes and experiences of people who have been affected by cancer.

Jessica takes over from Jackie Brunton, who worked as Lead Cancer Nurse for four years and is now focusing on the Trust's End of Life and Bereavement Care services.

Jackie added: "I've been privileged to work as Lead Nurse Cancer and End of Life for four years, and equally proud that we will now have dedicated and much-needed roles for cancer and end of life.

"These roles, along with other significant investment to palliative care, bereavement and cancer services teams, bring great opportunities to continue to support the development of these services and the care we provide to be the very best they can be for our community. I look forward to supporting Jess in her role – she will be fantastic."

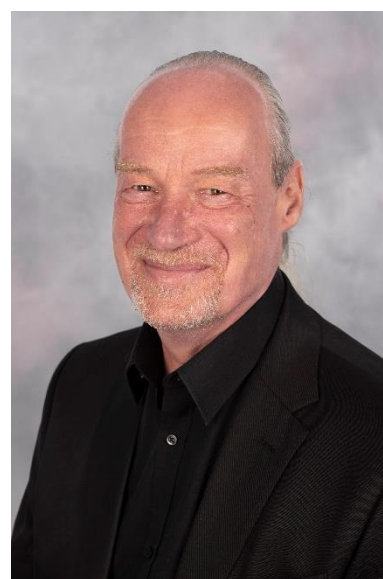
TONY WARNE TAKES NEW ROLE

VACCINATION TEAM MEMBERS 'GO THE EXTRA MILE'



Two members of the school-age vaccination team based at St Annes Health Centre have been praised for their work supporting a child attending a flu clinic.

Rachael Nurse and Kim Williamson are based on the second floor at the Durham Avenue site, and were nominated for one of the Trust's Going The Extra Mile Awards - which highlight the incredible work done every day by staff - by their colleague and clinical lead, Beverley Watson.

Beverley explained she nominated them after they helped a child who was upset attending a flu clinic and had been unable to have the

flu vaccination.

She wrote: “They spent 30 minutes with the girl and her mum, even FaceTimed Granddad to encourage her.

“The result was she had her flu vaccination and a very positive experience too. Mum was very grateful, and the child is protected against flu. What a fantastic job they did.”

Rachael said: “We work in such a lovely supportive team, where everybody always tries to go above and beyond for our patients.

“A lot of our patients have anxiety or phobias against injections. When we can help these children overcome their fears, it really makes us feel like we have done a good job.

“We had spent a lot of time with this little girl in school, but she didn’t want to have her nasal spray. We invited her and her mum to a clinic so that mum could be with her. She was still a little unsure, but we just spent time with her reassuring her, we even had her Grandad on FaceTime cheering her on.

“Seeing how proud she was of herself after she had overcome her fear, really makes our job worthwhile.”

TRUST SAYS THANK YOU FOR SURVEY RESPONSE



The results of the 2020 NHS Staff Survey were published last month, giving all of the Trust’s staff an opportunity to have a say and influence on the way the Trust is run. The Staff Survey plays a vital role in guiding how we measure and improve our performance.

We were delighted that more than 3,500 staff members participated in the survey and this week gifts were handed out to teams for outstanding performance and improvement rates in completing the survey.

Sharon Adams, the Trust’s Interim Operational Director of Human Resources (HR) and Organisational Development (OD) visited two teams to thank them for their hard work.

The Catering team at Blackpool Victoria Hospital went up from 19.4 per cent completion rate in 2019 to 65.8 per cent in 2020. This was an improvement of more than 46 per cent and 13 per cent higher than the second most improved team.

Meanwhile, the Medical Education Undergraduate Team had 100 per cent completion for the second consecutive year – the only team with more than 11 staff to achieve this milestone.

This year the Trust’s response rate to the survey overall rose to 49.5 per cent, compared to 46.9 per cent for the 2019 survey.
